of a Sick and Death Benefit Plan, and that the
Commander-in-Chief be empowered to appoint a
committee of two comrades of each Post who shall
draw up a possible plan before June 1, 1925, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

That the incoming Commander-in-Chief be em-
powered to put the plan submitted into effect within
30 days after the above report is submitted.—

IMMIGRATION PREFERENCE

al treatment for all Veterans.

KLAN THREATENS LAWYER

Candidate for Commonwealth Attorney in Virginia
Is Defiant

NORFOLK, Va., June 16.—B. A. Banks, a lawyer and former member of the Virginia Legislature, has been threatened in a letter written on the stationery of the Ku Klux Klan demanding that he retire from the race for Commonwealth Attorney. The letter, which is unsigned, says Banks's candidacy "is an insult," and continues: "Do you remember what happened to a certain party in Texas who defied this organization?"

The letter adds that the Baptist and the Methodist churches were behind the Klan and asserts "we will not stand for Catholics, Jews or Negroes holding office in the United States."

Banks is of Jewish descent.

"I intend to make the fight to the end," he said to-day.

We congratulate Mr. Banks on his courageous stand and we wish him success.

NEW BADGE FOR SOLDIERS

Insignia Available to All Who Served Nation in War

WASHINGTON, June 16 (A. P.)—A badge for wear with civilian clothes and to denote service in the army was authorized to-day by the War Department. It will be procured through the Quartermaster's Corps and made available by authorized agencies of the Government.

Those entitled to wear the new badge will be former or present enlisted personnel, commissioned officers, or nurses, who served in the military forces in time of war, those who have had army service training in peace times, and those who have been members of military units conducted under the War Department, including service as contract surgeons or veterinarians.

The badge sets forth an eagle with wings displayed, together with the national colors and the inscription, "National Defense."

SCORES "BOLSHEVISTIC JEWS"

LAKEWOOD, N. J. June 15.—The "renegade Jews who are identified with Bolshevism" were denounced here to-night by Rabbi B. L. Levinthal, of Philadelphia, in an address at the opening of the twenty-third annual convention of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States and Canada.

If the good Rabbi and others of the Jewish race would confine their scolding to "renegade Christians who profess to follow the teachings of Christ and who daily make of this teaching a mockery by their persecution of the Jews, he will be doing that which he was ordained to do.
