## THE LITTLE JEW WAS THERE

Continued—Part II.

The Jew to whom all these high  
tributes were paid is Sigmund Schle-  
singer of Los Angeles, Calif. He won  
them by his services in Forsyth's fa-  
mous fight with the Indians, on Sept.  
17, 1868. The battle, which was fought  
on the Republican River, in eastern  
Colorado, is one of the best known  
in the long and bloody story of "the  
winning of the West."

General Fry, in his book, "Army  
Sacrifices," published long ago, de-  
scribed Schlesinger, and tells how he  
came to take part in the battle, and  
how he conducted himself in it. He  
says:

"The others seemed to be inferior,  
and in all respects unfit for the service;  
a Jew, small, with narrow shoulders,  
sunken chest, quiet manner and piping  
voice, but little knowledge of firearms  
or horsemanship; he was, indeed, un-  
promising as a son of Mars, and, after  
forty-nine scouts had been obtained,  
was accepted only in order that he  
might be counted on the rolls to make  
up the fifty and enable the expedition  
to start." Later on, in his account of  
the fight, General Fry speaks of the  
"bravery, skill and untiring activity of  
the despised 'little Jew.' There was  
no sphere of gallantry or usefulness in  
which he was not conspicuous."

Inter-Religious Friendliness

The saving of the St. James Potestant Episcopal Church of Long Branch, N. J., from being sold per auction, through the contribution of \$650 by a Jew in order to pay the taxes of the church is the subject of praise by the New York "Telegram," which says:

"The plight of the church appeared in the newspapers, a bit of deserving publicity, but with no appeal for funds. The annual episcopal visitation was held at the church on Sunday, and with it came a voluntary contribution from Herman Levy of \$650 to pay the tax bill. 'Although we are not of the same faith, we believe in the same God,' said he.

A "fine gesture" remarks the "Day" speaking of the same incident. The "Day" however expresses the hope that such acts of inter-religious friendship might be "less one-sided," remarking: "Such manifestations of neighborly good will are in the best traditions of Americanism and Judaism; would they were more common and less one-sided."

ARABS WISH TO CREATE "SMOKE BANK" TO SAVE PALESTINE FROM ZIONISTS

Jerusalem, Sept. 8.—Saving Palestine through not smoking is the latest idea of some of the Arab leaders who decided to conform with the commandment of the Koran which prohibits Moslems from smoking.

Five Arab notables decided to discontinue smoking for the purpose of establishing a fund for a bank to "save Palestine from the Zionist menace." The bank is to be known as the "smoke bank."

The Arab paper "El Carmel" warmly supports the idea and urges Arabs to abandon smoking and give the sums saved toward the "smoke bank."

Have you got a place reserved? If not, why not! Did You bring in at least one advertisement for our Souvenir Journal which we expect from every comrade?

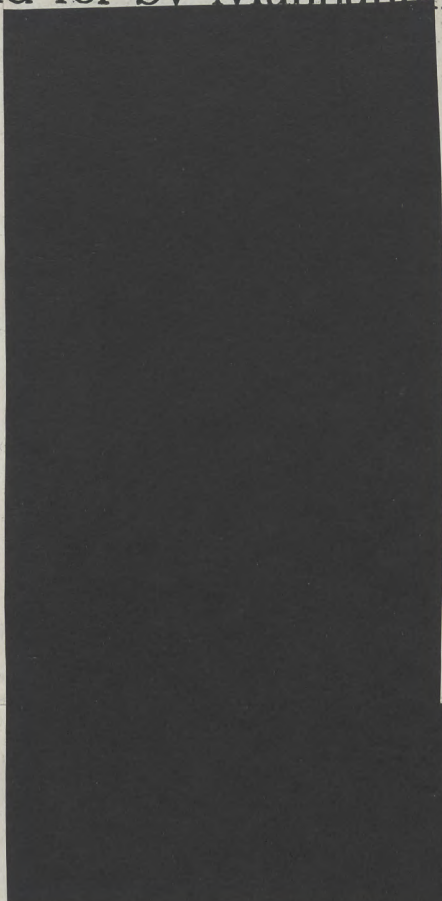
