**The Mexican War**

On this struggle the published data is comparatively meager; as additional sources of information are disclosed the names of other Jews who bore a share in this war will undoubtedly be revealed. Among those known to have participated therein were: Surgeon-General Moses Albert Levy, Colonel Leon Dyer, Major Alfred Mordecai, Lieutenant Henry Seeligson, complimented by General Zachary Taylor for conspicuous bravery at Monterey; Sergeant Jacob Davis, Sergeant Samuel Henry; Corporal Jacob Hirschborn, David S. Kaufman, and Adolphus Sterne.

# JACOB CASH—PATRIOT

## Part Three

An unusual combination that—a hard-headed business man whose rise from a penniless immigrant to a position of comparative ease and luxury is like a story by Horatio Alger of school-day memory.

The difference is that Alger's heroes always rested content on what they got, while the hero of these articles is very earnest in his desire to return, or as he terms it "pay back," some of the debts he owes to America.

It was this thought which led Jacob Cash to fire a broadside into the ranks of "the enemy within our gates" by the publication of "Whither America."

It was this thought again, which led to the organization of the United States Patriotic Society.

Permit me to digress for a moment and mention a series of articles recently published in a New York paper captioned "Why the Jew Wins."

These articles are supposedly in defense of the Jew and in a spirit of friendship.

The writer is led to pray that the Lord deliver us from such friends. However, a statement was made in these articles that the U. S. Patriotic Society was organized by Jews.

As a matter of fact, with the exception of Jacob Cash, founder, and one or two other Jews, the roster contains such names as Dr. Michael C. O'Brien, Hon. Duncan T. O'Brien, James D. Hackett, Hon. Royal A. Weller, Hon. Wm. T. Collins, Hon. M. J. Healy, Hon. Wm. H. Cornell and the like.

Getting back to Jacob Cash: having organized this Society to counteract the insidious communistic anti-American propaganda, he next issued a monthly publication, "The Patriot." The main topic in this little pamphlet appears to be—WAKE UP AMERICA.

As we have already stated Jacob Cash advocates the distribution of American propaganda to the alien in the language he can read when he lands upon our shores.

He, himself has spent thousands in his preachings and in furthering the work on which his heart is set.

He says: "If it is worth while for a small group of Anarchists and Communists to preach their doctrines to the newcomer in America, why shouldn't it be OUR duty to teach OUR principles of equality for all, OUR form of government, OUR way of living, OUR

institutions—in other words—teach them AMERICA?"

And so came the culmination of his self-imposed task in the publication of a book long in preparation—"WHAT AMERICA MEANS TO ME"

This book, primarily the life story of Jacob Cash, is the story of thousands of immigrants.

Of these thousands many have been successful but none have been moved as has Jacob Cash to feel that he owes a debt to America which he wants to pay.

"What America Means to Me" has the endorsement of everyone who reads it.

Chief Justice William Howard Taft, Governor Al Smith, Governors, Senators, Judges, Professional and Business men in every walk of life highly commend the book and its author.

The books sells for a dollar—the entire proceeds go to the U. S. Patriotic Society to help carry on the work of Americanization.

Jacob Cash offers to the Jewish Veterans fifty per cent of the gross sales of his book through National Headquarters.

Some day Jacob Cash is going on a tour through the foreign quarters of New York.

He will distribute, free, in the tongue of the particular quarter, as many copies of "Whither America" as may be required.

The writer hopes to be invited to accompany him on his Mission of Americanization.

In a previous number we stated that Cash was a great admirer of Roosevelt. Apparently he is no stranger to the Roosevelts.

At the recent banquet to Col. Roosevelt on his return from hunting the Ovis Poli, the writer was amazed on greeting the Colonel with Cash, at the former, in all that clamorous throng finding the time for a little private chat with Cash.

After the banquet, a group picture which was taken of Col. Roosevelt, Cash and others will make a nice souvenir. Here ends the story of **Jacob Cash, Patriot.**

His activities will go on till the fruits will bloom and ripen into a beautiful understanding of America by all who have their being under its glorious institutions.

If we are to help our comrades and their dependents, we must all work together and raise a fund sufficient for our needs.
