URGES JOBS FOR DISABLED

Pershing Says Government Department Heads Evade Law

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Declaring that the United States could do more to help its disabled veterans to find employment, General John J. Pershing today told the Special Committee on Veterans Preference, appointed by President Coolidge, that France was finding more employment for her disabled veterans than this country.

The former commander of the American Expeditionary Forces declared that there was a very definite impression "among us all" that the law providing preference for veterans seeking Government employment was in many cases circumvented by department heads. Congressional influence was advanced by him as one reason for this.

Rowan B. Truley, Assistant Superintendent of the Postoffice Service in charge of personnel, was the centre of a hot cross-fire when he disclosed that out of the last 100 new employes appointed as substitute clerks in New York City only two were former service men. Representative Hamilton Fish, Jr., Chairman of the committee, and Frank T. Hines, director of the Veterans' Bureau, demanded the reason. Mr. Tuley promised to investigate. He admitted the New York figures were exceptionally low.

GOODMAN POST RECEIVED COLORS

Mr. and Mrs. A. Goodman of Williamson, W. Va., presented a beautiful flag to the Herbert J. Goodman Post No. 17 of Cleveland in memory of their son after whom the Post is named.

The Flag was received in time for the annual Memorial Services held by the Goodman Post.

JEWISH VETERANS ESCORT PRIZE STUDENTS TO PHILADELPHIA

Captain Jacob Rubinoff In Command

At the request of Comrade Israel Chipkin, Director of the Jewish Education Association, Capt. Jacob Rubinoff, Judge Advocate General of J.V.W.R., was designated by the Commander-in-Chief to organize an escort to accompany one thousand prize pupils of the Education Association to a pilgrimage to Independence Hall in Philadelphia on July 4th.

The Colors of all the New York Posts were borne by the escort.

The entire contingent left the Pennsylvania Depot in a special train and at Philadelphia our escort was further augmented by a delegation from Philadelphia Post.

Buses in Philadelphia conveyed the outfit to Fairmount Park where they were received by Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief and Commander of Philadelphia Post, Samuel E. Fine, and others of the Post, and a day of profitable and patriotic exercises was enjoyed by all.

Comrade Chipkin expressed himself as greatly pleased with the co-operation of the Jewish Veterans of the Wars of the Republic.

The signers of the call were Edward M. Chase, the philanthropist of Manchester, N. H.; Dr. Louis I. Dublin of the Metropolitan Insurance Co.; Henry Hurwitz, leader of the Menorah Movement; Professor M. M. Kaplan, leader of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism, Judge William M. Lewis of Philadelphia; Israel Matz of Brooklyn, and Professor L. L. Silverman of Dartmouth.

CUTLER POST**Jewish War Veterans**

Continuous applause attended the progress of the Jewish Veterans of the Wars of the Republic in the Borough Day parade recently.

With sleeves bearing foreign service and wound chevrons, Col. Harry Cutler Post, No. 3, led by Commander Maurice Snow, once more "fell in" and with the same vim that characterized the members in the "Big Parade" of 1917-18 and all other wars of the Republic, marched proudly up the Concourse and passed the reviewing stand.

On the staff of Commander Snow were Morris Greenberg, senior vice-commander; Maurice Baumfeld, junior vice-commander and Sam Rosenfeld, chaplain.

Considerable interest was centered upon a slender, smiling "doughboy" with a Distinguished Service Cross gleaming upon his breast, who marched alongside Commander Snow as his aide. Ten years have elapsed since that same doughboy played the hero in one of the most astonishing exploits of the World War. The Bronx surely has not forgotten him.

"There's Abe Krotoshinsky!" was the exclamation evoked from the spectators constantly as he trudged up. It was indeed Krotoshinsky.

Wonder if General O'Ryan knows that we don't get sugar in the coffee?

7:35 a.m. Nicely settled down to read the morning paper and to attend to my correspondence. You bet I'll write Fannie a nice—"Fall in for company drill." Great Scott! I didn't know they started to work so early in the army. Thought that all soldiers had to do was to fix up for dress parade so people could see how fine they looked. But I am as good as any man in this here camp, and maybe the captain needs me to help him out in the drill.

JEWISH COUNCIL CONDEMNS PUBLICITY HARMFUL TO ZIONISM

The Jewish Council of Greater New York at a meeting held recently adopted resolutions deploring and condemning the action of certain elements in American Jewry who in recent issues of the general press recklessly spread broadcast, invectives, insinuations and detailed statements derogative to the cause of Zion, regardless of the injury to the welfare of our People.

The Council also adopted resolutions endorsing a contemplated campaign to raise funds on behalf of 600,000 European Jewish War Invalids, Widows and Orphans, who are represented in this country by Professor Benzion Lazar of Vienna, Zacharies Jutan of Vilna and Abraham Reisler of Lembourg.

Commander-in-Chief Morris J. Mendelsohn is President of the Jewish Council of Greater New York.

**CONSTITUTIONAL
AMENDMENTS**

In accordance with the Constitution and By-Laws, proposed amendments must be adopted by the Posts and promulgated in the "Jewish Veteran" 30 days prior to the Encampment.

Adolf R. Jungman Post No. 2 of Brooklyn sends us the following Amendments adopted at a regular meeting of the Post June 27, 1928:

1. Amendment to the Constitution:

Article IV—Section 1

This organization shall consist of active members, honorary members, associate members and patrons.

Article IV—Section 4a

Any person who has rendered valuable aid to a Post may be elected as a PATRON provided that person is not eligible to active or associate membership.

2. Amendment to the Rules and Regulations:

Article XII—Section 1—

Dues and Revenue

The National Encampment shall assess a per capita tax on each Post of \$3.00 per annum on each and every active and associate member in good standing therein as of the date of the return, which includes a year's subscription to the "Jewish Veteran", the official organ of this organization. Such tax shall be payable in semi-annual installments and shall be forwarded to the Quartermaster General on the 1st day of January and July.

THAT BINGHAMTON POST

Comrade H. B. Jungman, Executive Director of the Jewish Community Center of Binghamton, New York, has hard sledding in his efforts to organize a Post in Binghamton.

However, we have great hopes for such a Post and we know that Jungman will be on the job until the objective is gained.

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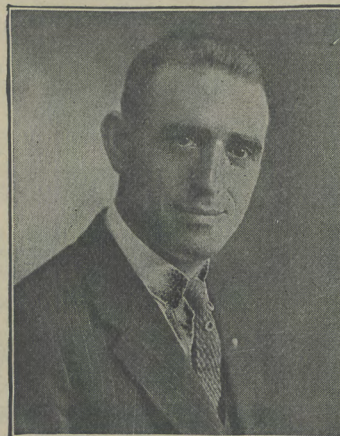
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
