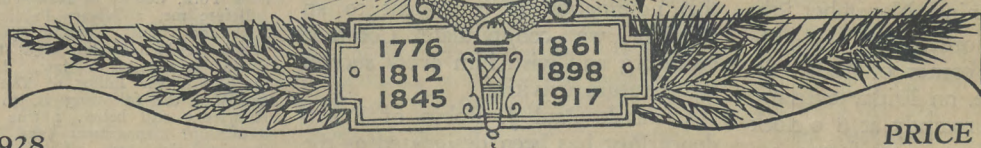

## AND HERE'S LOS ANGELES

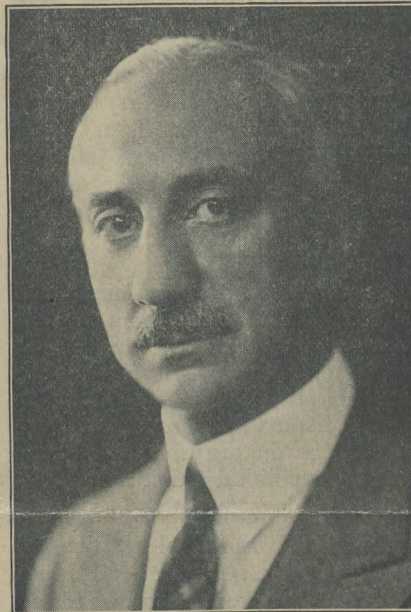

In order to make this a truly anniversary celebration of the Armistice it will be held at 11 o'clock in the morning on Sunday, November 11, 1928.

The program for this occasion is being worked out by a Committee of the Louis Fleischman Benevolent Society, working in conjunction with the Commander-in-Chief, and includes music by a quartet selected from the orchestra of the Capitol Theatre; songs by a noted singer; opening prayer by Rev. Dr. Edward Lissmand, with benedictions by Dr. Julius Price of the Sinai Temple in the Bronx.

The Honorable Louis D. Gibbs, one of the Supreme Court Justices of the City of New York, has been invited to deliver the Armistice Day address.

As a part of the Armistice service the Louis Fleischman Benevolent Society will present to the National organization a set of silk Colors, with guidons.

It is essential that every Post in the Metropolitan area send large delegations of members and friends to this function in order to favorably impress the gathering. Indications are that the Louis Fleischman Benevolent Society and many other organizations will send large delegations, and the entire membership of the Sinai Temple will, in all probability, be present.

### BOOK REVIEW

By COL. M. J. MENDELSON

"The Biograph of Harry Fishel," by Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein (Block Publishing Co., New York), appeals to us very strongly as a work well written and one, unfortunately, of the too few books of this character wherein is related the story of a Jew, the kind of Jew that has our greatest admiration, who comes to America and, despite the early handicaps of oppression, succeeds, after years of hardships and struggles, not only in establishing himself on a sound financial structure but who is not unmindful of his humble origin, and in memory of his early struggles renders material, physical and financial aid to all causes of suffering and distress.

It is a far cry from the poor immigrant, Harry Fishel, to the opulent Harry Fishel who calmly signs a check for one million dollars to the Joint Distribution Committee for general relief.

For us to write the kind of review we feel that the subject warrants would require more than the entire space in this little publication of ours. It were well if the efforts of Rabbi Goldstein were to set an example for others to follow in paying proper tribute to those worthy of such tribute during their lifetime rather than to erect memorials to their memory after they are gone.

This volume should be in the home of every Jew, particularly of the many Jews who have still to learn the meaning of charity.
