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EDITORIAL

Money has been defined as a medium of exchange. It has been defined in many other ways. Define it as you will, it is not only desirable, but very essential. Money is the oil which lubricates the machinery of existence.

If our genial Quartermaster General were writing this Editorial, his message would have been conveyed in the first three lines, and my job would have been ended. By this time, comrades, you must all understand what we are driving at.

We have an organization, and we believe a desirable and worth-while organization, with excellent purposes and record of accomplishment. Depression or not, the organization must continue, its work unabated; in fact, it seems that in depression our burdens are heavier.

Our monetary lubrication is furnished by (1) per capita tax, (2) commission from supplies (3) revenue from public functions and (4) advertisements in our magazine.

Each post should examine itself, and answer "Have we paid our per capita tax (third quarter due September 30th, 1934)?" "Are we buying our supplies from National Quality and price guaranteed?" "Have we submitted our quota of advertisements for the Jewish Veteran?" As soon as a National Function is arranged, the answer to question (3) will be framed "Have we cooperated in making the affair a success?"

Although these questions are hypothetical they are VERY REAL. Our recent

National Convention adopted a program of activity and expansion, becoming for J.W.V. Every comrade would like to see their fulfillment. Already fourteen new posts have been organized. We should like to make a National Rehabilitation Office in Washington, and a paid Organizer, realities.

These items and many others CAN BE DONE. But we need MONEY. We do not seek contributions. We but ask that you pay any indebtedness you may owe to Headquarters, that you pay your Per Capita Tax WHEN DUE; that you purchase your supplies through our Supply Department; and that each post try to submit at least one regular AD for the Jewish Veteran.

It is unfortunate on opening this issue that the first item should be on this subject of Money. But at least we're frank. We must have Money. We Need Money. We know you will not resent our request, but like good soldiers will chip in your share, and permit our finance officers to carry on the way our National Officers want to for the best interest of J. W. V.

Post Commanders—Attention!

In accordance with ARTICLE 11, SECTION 32 of the BY-LAWS per capita tax forms and installments are now due, all Commanders are urgently requested to comply herewith, for your information and guidance we quote the following:

ARTICLE 11, SECTION 32, BY-LAWS

There is hereby assessed upon each and every member in good standing, as hereinafter provided, a per capita tax of (\$2.00) Two Dollars per annum, payable by each Post. A member is considered in good standing until the Post shall have, after due notice and upon proper cause authorized by these by-laws, suspended such member from all rights of membership. Such per capita tax shall be due and payable in quarterly installments in advance immediately after the last meeting in the months of March, June, September and December. The tax shall be based upon each member in good standing after the close of such meeting. Each Post shall report the standing of its membership to National Headquarters four (4) times annually after the close of the last meeting in the months of March, June, September and December of each year, under the regulations issued by the Commander-in-Chief or under his authority. The number of Delegates and Alternates each Post shall be entitled to, shall be based upon the last report received from the Post provided that if a Post is delinquent in any report or has failed to pay any per capita tax or other indebtedness to National Headquarters, it shall be excluded from representation at any National Convention or meeting of the Executive Council.

Per capita tax forms are now in your possession; kindly complete and forward with check, to National Headquarters.

THE BOYCOTT

We haven't heard of much activity by J.W.V. Posts to further the Boycott. We hope, however, that Posts and Auxiliaries are doing their work as vigorously as ever. Now, isn't NOW as good a time as any to start?

After all, J.W.V. started the Boycott several other organizations trying to take the honor, to the contrary), and good soldiers always finish a job they undertake. Hitler is still in power, and Jews are being persecuted and oppressed as much as ever in Germany. Our job won't be done until Hitlerism is terminated, and Jews are restored to their proper place in the German Reich. To date the Boycott is the only weapon suggested to end German barbarism. It takes very little individual effort to practice the Boycott. Why don't you?

As a pioneer and leader, it is not sufficient that you and your family - - that all Jews - - Boycott. Jews are a small minority of the world population, and if Jews Boycotted 100 per cent, we would make only a small dent in Germany's economic situation. You must get others to Boycott! Who?

Everyone knows some Union men. At a convention last week, the A.F. of L. reiterated its stand to Boycott German merchandise. However, the A.F. of L., due to its many other activities has been unable to organize its membership to actively join in the Boycott. It's YOUR JOB to speak to every Union man and/or woman you know and urge their cooperation. Inform them that labor Unions have been banned in Hitler-land, that labor has been reduced practically to slavery, and that three hundred million dollars of union assets were confiscated by Hitler.

Catholics have been persecuted in Germany almost as much as Jews. Their priests have been arrested, some wounded and killed, Catholic societies, their youth movement and liberties restricted. Hitler's treaty with the Vatican has been flagrantly violated. To end Hitlerism is the devout wish of every Catholic. It is up to YOU to speak to your

Catholic Neighbor, and urge his cooperation in the Boycott.

The Protestant Church in Germany has been split in two, due to Hitler's attempt to Nazify that church. The German Protestant ministers are possibly the staunchest opponents of Hitlerism. Naturally, Protestants everywhere are unsympathetic with the regime that attempts to paganize their religion. It's your job to point out to them that the Boycott is the only known method to bring the barbaric rulers of the German people to their senses.

In like manner, you can and should approach professional men, artists, and liberals of all faiths and creeds, to assist in the Boycott. This is not a Jewish battle - - it is a fight for Civilization and Peace, in which all MUST join.

In spite of all efforts, there are still many Jewish consumers who do not scruple to buy German goods. Perhaps it is a libel to describe them as "Jews." Many Jewish importers still import, and many more Jewish merchants still handle German merchandise. There are some in your city. It's your job to find them. It should not be necessary to advise you what to do with them. In times like these, traitors have no place in our ranks.

We appreciate that these times are difficult—that most are hard-put to earn a livelihood. But unless each of YOU do YOUR share, where will we be? You are witnessing the daily growth of anti-Semitism—yes, right here in the U.S.A. You've heard of restrictions, here, there and everywhere. It is becoming more difficult for Jews to enter colleges or secure employment. Haven't you noticed your business, clients or patients slipping? You may be satisfied for yourself, but what about your children? The successful termination of Hitlerism will be an everlasting investment for Jewry. A noted person recently stated that if we ever have pogroms in America, they will be much worse than they ever had in Russia. We are not pessimistic, but these are facts!

Germany is today the fountain of anti-
