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JWV ALERTED AGAINST NEW "PEACE CRUSADE" INSTITUTED BY REDS

JWV units throughout the country were alerted this month against the newest Communist "peace" offensive in this country.

The latest Communist gimmick on the ideological war front is a movement calling itself the "American Peace Crusade." Equipped with the usual cooing adjectives, "American Peace Crusade" is the replacement for the "Partisans For Peace" movement which last year came up with the so-called "Stockholm Peace Petition."

While the 1950 "peace" drive was aimed at pressuring the United States into discontinuing the manufacture of atomic weapons, the 1951 effort is believed to have these three objectives in view:

Withdrawal of United States troops from United Nations armies in Korea, which, of course, would mean handing over Korea to Communism.

Reversal of the U. S. position on the admission of Communist China to the United Nations.

An offer by the U. S. to negotiate peace with Communist China on the Korean issue.

Warning that the leaders of the "American Peace Crusade" are nothing more than "American servants of Communism," National Commander Henry Albert, in a release to all JWV units, labeled the Communist campaign "off limits" to JWV and its members and urged all JWV units to "alert all communities to the true character of this newest Communist device for confusing and dividing the American people."

The directive called special attention to "Crusade" plans for organizing "peace" fronts in Philadelphia, Chicago and Los Angeles

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INTOLERANCE, TARGET OF JWV UNITY STAMPS

In a personal letter to every JWV member and JWVA sister, National Commander Henry Albert called for mass purchase of the JWV Unity Stamps to support the National program to combat racial and religious intolerance.

Undertaken for the second consecutive year, the newly-designated Unity Stamp reminds every patriotic American of the need to preserve American unity through disinfecting the poison spread by professional hate sheets and street corner rabble-rousers.

Comrade Albert requested the JWV membership to remit promptly their contributions for the stamps to National Headquarters.

BROTHERHOOD WEEK IS OBSERVED BY ALL JWV UNITS THROUGHOUT U.S.

In preliminary reports reaching National Headquarters as this issue of the JEWISH VETERAN went to press a record participation by JWV units throughout the country in the 1951 observance of National Brotherhood Week is indicated.

National Commander Henry Albert emphasized that the underlying theme of Brotherhood as practiced by JWV components is based on a year round observance to the principles underlying this annual event sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews. Commander Albert participated in a radio program in New York City inaugurating Brotherhood Week along with three clergymen representing the Catholic, Protestant and Jewish Faiths and other prominent persons. He also appeared at several JWV functions in neighboring states during this period.

Program plans and summaries forwarded to National Headquarters by posts, counties and state departments showed varied means of observing this annual occasion. Many units paid honor to Christian and Jewish individuals in local communities for outstanding contributions to interfaith unity. Many posts reported of joint meetings and programs with Catholic and Protestant veterans of other organizations.

In some communities, essay and oratorical contests were sponsored and prizes were awarded to local grade and high school students who excelled in these contests. Others reported programs ranging from joint veterans parades to public rallies and meetings participated in by prominent individuals of all faiths.
