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CWV, JWV County Units Back Petition Against Red Bias

A special emergency meeting has set the wheels in motion to obtain many thousands of signatures to a petition asking Congress and the United Nations to halt the persecution now being visited upon minorities by the Soviet Union and its satellites, it has been announced by the JWV Kings County Council. The petition is being sponsored jointly by the Catholic War Veterans and the Jewish War Veterans of Brooklyn.

County Commander Emanuel Greenberg of the JWV addressed 350 delegates, urging the members to set up stands at strategic locations throughout the borough to obtain the signatures. Commander Greenberg further announced that he had appointed Ted Brooks, past county commander of the Council as chairman.

Pass Bias Resolution

At a recent county convention of the CWV, a resolution was adopted condemning acts of discrimination and violence against one minority group as a threat

to all minority groups, said Joseph H. Clune, commander of the Brooklyn Catholic War Veterans.

The program is part of a national program designed to educate the public to the evils of Communism.

The resolution, accusing Soviet Russia of embarking upon a "program of genocide, annihilation of minority groups and deprivation of religious liberties," warns that "acts of discrimination and violence against one minority group is a threat to all minority groups." It urges a boycott against goods from the Iron Curtain countries and economic sanctions against the Reds, supported by the United States and the U. N.

Ask Passage Of Anti-Bias Bill

BROOKLYN, N. Y.—The Kings County Council has urged New York State legislators to pass the Metcalf-Jack Bill to create a temporary State Commission to investigate discrimination in housing, it was learned recently.

JWVer Named Chairman Of CWV Affair

NEW YORK, N. Y.—David A. Schulte Jr., member of the Charles and Murray Gordon Post of the Jewish War Veterans, was appointed honorary chairman of the annual entertainment and ball of the New York County chapter of the Catholic War Veterans, it was reported in a story in the Jan. 24 edition of the New York "Irish Echo."

The affair was held Jan. 23 in the Hotel New Yorker. During the evening Zasu Pitts was presented with the County's Americanism Award by Commander Ted Backes for her work in fighting Communism in the entertainment world.

Mr. Schulte, in addition to his JWV activities, has served as chairman of the Washington Heights B'nai B'rith United Jewish Appeal Committee for several years and is a member of the executive committee of the McNally Post of the American Legion.

National Commander To Address Jewish Leaders in Indiana

National Commander Jesse Moss has been invited to address the annual meeting of the Indianapolis Jewish Community Relations Council on the 23rd of March. The meeting, one of the most important events of its kind, traditionally attracts top Jewish leaders in Indianapolis. Among those expected to attend is Julius Freeman, president of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds. Moss, who will be the only speaker at the occasion, is the first JWV commander to have received this invitation.

A letter from David M. Cook, president of the Council, noted that "in view of the many developments in the field of Jewish community relations and in view of our proximity to the national headquarters of the American Legion, an address by the National Commander of the Jewish War Veterans of the United States would be of the utmost significance to the Jewish community of Indianapolis."

Commander Moss plans to discuss the major tasks confronting

Jewish community relations agencies, including such items as immigration, the Communist menace at home and anti-Semitism behind the iron curtain.

Free Sons 221 Makes Second Recorder Gift

Noting the enthusiasm aroused by the disc recorder sent to Korea recently, the Free Sons of Israel Post 221 of New York has voted to buy a second recorder for use at local veteran hospitals, it was announced in the post "Bulletin." Contracts for the recorder, blank discs and cutting needles. The recorder sent to Korea arrived in Taegu just in time for a Chanukah party and was immediately pressed into service as part of the celebration.

(The Chaplain Speaks)

... Hardened soldiers choked up during the recordings and others just rambled on and muttered words of astonishment... already almost 100 recordings have been made and the project is proving a huge success... it would be advisable to keep up the stock of blank records, cutting needles, etc., and per your instructions I hereby put in a request for additional blank records. (The Private Speaks)

Saturday we celebrated Chanukah here at H. Q. Korean Communications Zone with a party in the Chapel Social Hall. . . . My heartiest thanks to your Post 221, Free Sons of Israel JWV for making available to us the wonderful recording machine and records. It gave me the opportunity to talk to my folks and to my girl for the first time since early in June. . . . The records are on their way home and will surely be treasured when received. My husband and I cannot thank you enough for a most wonderful surprise Chanukah gift which we received on Monday. It was a recording made by our son, Pvt. Henry B. Rosenberg, who is stationed at Taegu, Korea. We know you supplied the equipment for this... my son wrote that a recording machine and one thousand records had been given to the chaplain through your Post 221, Free Sons of Israel, Jewish War Veterans.
