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TARLOV ELECTED COMMANDER

New JWV Chief Blueprints Major Drive Against Fascism

Malcolm A. Tarlov of Norwalk, Connecticut, a World War II Infantry NCO, was elected National Commander of the Jewish War Veterans of the U. S. A. at the 71st Annual National Convention last month.

The new commander vowed to muster a major drive against a "new wave of bigotry that is sweeping the country."

An insurance executive, Commander Tarlov, 45, has been active in JWV and community affairs since his discharge from the Armed Forces in 1945. He served with the invasion forces of Patton's 3rd Army.

In his inaugural address before the more than 2,000 delegates attending the 71st Annual National Convention, Commander Tarlov blueprinted a major drive to arrest "a new wave of fascism" that is gathering momentum on the heels of "needless fears generated by a total misunderstanding of the civil rights movement."

"The bigots . . . the Fascists, the McCarthyites, the Nazis are brazenly crawling out of the woodwork again, attempting to

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Paul Ribner Wins Second Highest Elective Office

Paul Ribner, 38, a Philadelphia lawyer and former Air Force Captain last month was elected National Judge Advocate, the second highest office in the Jewish War Veterans of the United States of America, at JWV's 71st Annual Convention.

Mr. Ribner is the first veteran of the Korean War to achieve high office in the nation's oldest active war veterans organization.

A former Deputy Attorney General of Pennsylvania from 1955 to 1963, he is a partner in the Philadelphia law firm of Lederer and Ribner. He has been a past JWV Department Commander of Pennsylvania and last year served

Humphrey Addresses JWV; Parallels Vietnam to Munich

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, addressing the 71st Annual National Convention of the Jewish War Veterans of the U.S.A., late last month warned against what he termed "new isolationism" in America and said he sensed "a dangerous tendency in our country toward not only the compartmentalization once more of 'foreign' and 'domestic' policies, but also toward retreat from responsibility."

Introduced by National Commander Milton A. Waldor, the Vice President was awarded JWV's Gold Medal of Merit.

Mr. Humphrey said he was surprised by recent pressure from "responsible" quarters to reduce Viet Nam spending to meet domestic needs. He stressed the interrelation of the Administration's domestic and foreign policies and emphasized the necessity of challenging aggression in Viet Nam. He likened the Viet Nam war to efforts he said should have been made in the 1930's to stop

aggression by Germany in the Rhineland and at Munich.

Commending the JWV for staunchly backing the Administration on Viet Nam, Mr. Humphrey said that "aggression unchecked is aggression unleashed. It is better to take a stand than to face a total war later."

He lauded Vietnamese election preparations and paid tribute to the courage of citizens of that country who might brave Viet Cong reprisals for voting. He said "it is a vital and funda-

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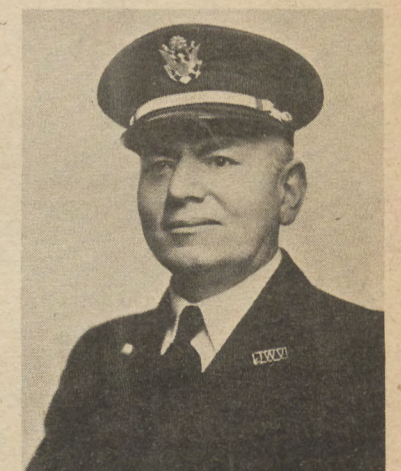
